Mayor Meeting with Congressman Tom Suozzi



More than 30 mayors convened with Congressman Tom Suozzi to discuss our priorities and the key issues he should prioritize in Washington, DC. Representing the Village of Port Washington North, the Mayor advocated for the reinstating the full SALT (State And Local Tax) deduction and increased funding for the inclusive playground project. There is currently a federal cap of \$10,000 on deducting state and local taxes. So, any taxpayer with more than \$10,000 of NY State income tax and property taxes are not able to take the full amount as an itemized deduction on their federal income tax calculation. The cap disproportionately impacts states like New York that charge state income taxes and have property taxes exceeding \$10,000. The Mayor has advocated to remove the cap or significantly increase it to benefit those residents who deduct it from their federal tax liabilities.

Village of Port Washington North's Fiscal Stress Score

The Office of the State Comptroller uses the Fiscal Stress Monitoring System to examine the annual financial information reported by our Village. This analysis provides an objective assessment of the fiscal challenges facing individual local governments and school districts, identifying situations where corrective action may be needed. These 2023 scores are based on fiscal year-end results.

Our evaluation represents the lowest stress level, of which the Village should be proud. We are always working hard behind the scenes to balance and maintain our Village budget. The zero score represents the highest ranking we could receive.

The Public Works Department will soon be addressing residents' concerns regarding sidewalks and aprons throughout the Village.

The first step in the process is to examine every sidewalk and determine sidewalks or aprons need replacing. Once a decision is made to replace various flags (individual 4x4 sections of sidewalk) of sidewalk or an apron, it will be marked out with white spray paint, often with arrows pointing to each other.

Before sidewalks can be removed, mark-outs need to be completed in order to alert the sidewalk contractor exactly where the various utility lines are located. This includes water, gas, electric, and cable.

Many residents may wonder what the colors mean. Here is a quick guide:

Dark red - ELECRTRIC

Yellow - GAS-OIL-STEAM

Blue - WATER


Orange- CABLE or COMMUNICATIONS

Green - SEWER Pink - TEMPORARY SURVEY

White – PROPOSED EXCAVATION (including sidewalk, curb and driveways)
Once mark-outs are completed, the removal will begin, likely in mid to late May. Homeowners will be contacted directly if any construction interferes with their driveway.
