# **Actions from August 6th Board Meeting**

- Awarded lightning maintenance contract to NY Trenchless, our current provider.
- Contracted with Absolute Auctions and Realty Inc. to auction off our 2008 F-250 which was replaced with a new F-250.
- Re-opened new Oasis Site Plan Review hearing to allow for possible information to be put into the record. The hearing is scheduled for November 19th, 2024
- Updated the board on the accessible include playground project. Holding our first Playground Advisory Committee meeting scheduled for August 27th. At that time, an updated playground plan design was being unveiled.
- Unlimited Play and Little Tikes Commercial will be joining us at our September 10th meeting to discuss updates to the playground and solicit input from the board.



#### **Stormwater Protection During Fall Season**

Residents should be aware of specific sources of stormwater pollution unique to the fall season. Leaf litter and yard waste dumped into stormwater drains can cause dangerous pollutants to enter the waterways.

Similarly, excess yard fertilizer, not absorbed by the soil, washes away with the rain and can add harsh chemicals to the waterways. Residents should dispose of leaf litter and yard waste properly, never in the street or drain, and should avoid using fertilizer before a rainstorm or in excess.

## **Angler Lane Flooding Concerns**


We have been made aware by a number of residents on Angler lane that they experienced significant flooding up their street during the past two significant rainstorm events. The Village did implement improvements to the drainage system two years ago. Given that it may not be sufficient enough, we are in the process of engaging our village engineers to draft a proposal to examine the drainage system as a whole in the efforts to improve the flooding. We expect to have this proposal for the board to approve at the next meeting.



# **Baywalk Improvements**



We've enhanced the look and functionality of Bay Walk Park by installing artificial turf. The pea gravel near the pavilion has been removed, along with the unsightly mess it created. Now, in its place, is a lush green lawn perfect for placing Adirondack rocking chairs, cleaning a kayak, or simply sitting down to enjoy the view.



# **Water Main Project Update**

We anticipate completing the water main portion of the work on Cow Neck Road & Bay Drive on Wednesday August 28th. On Thursday August 29th we anticipate starting to perform connections on Woodlawn Road, and then starting work on Fishermans Drive, Boat Lane, and Seaview Lane which will take approximately three weeks.

### **Back To School Tips**

#### **Back To School Tips**

Stranger Danger Tips

- Don't Talk to Strangers: Remind your children not to talk to, accept gifts from, or go anywhere with someone they don't know, even if the person seems friendly.
- Safe Distance: Teach your children to maintain a safe distance from strangers and to run away if someone they don't know approaches them in a way that makes them uncomfortable.
- Know Safe Places: Encourage children to identify safe places they can go if they feel threatened, such as a friend's house, a school, or a public place with lots of people.
- Use a Buddy System: Whenever possible, children should walk to and from school with a friend or in a group. There's safety in numbers.
- Trust Their Instincts: Remind your children that it's okay to say "no" and to trust their instincts. If something doesn't feel right, they should get away and tell a trusted adult immediately.

#### **Movie Studio Update and Port North Filming**

Port North was chosen for filming on Channel Drive, for FBI: Most Wanted, which will feature an exciting action sequence. The car will crash through a prop gate on Channel Drive, alongside a guard booth and utility pole props built on Village property, including the future Village Hall site (currently the dog walking park).

The movie studio is scheduled to officially open by October 1, but we will provide further updates. The scene filmed there involves an armored car crashing out of the new studio building, which is being used as a "depository," while being pursued by an FBI Tahoe.





#### **Senior Scam Presentation**

The meeting, held at 7 PM by Police Sergeant Peter Griffith, focused on scam prevention and provided residents with valuable information to help protect themselves from potential fraud. Sergeant Griffith also updated the community on recent police activity in our area and reassured everyone that the police force will continue regular patrols to keep our village safe and informed. Several residents were in attendance to benefit from this important presentation.

Here is some information he provided during the meeting, that will be also available on our website: Do not volunteer any information such as name, address, social security number to unknown people over the telephone or internet. Remember "If it seems too good to be true, it usually is."

Stop and think before you hand money over to anybody. Whenever you are contacted by someone asking for money you should consult a trusted friend, relative or neighbor for advice.

Many times the con artist will instruct the victim not to tell anyone or "something bad" will happen. And many times after being conned, the victim will be reluctant to tell anyone, because they fear that they will be thought of as senile or no longer capable of making good decisions. Anyone can be conned.

#### IF IT'S AN EMERGENCY:

- -Dial 9-1-1.
- -Stay calm, speak slowly.
- -Senior Citizens are often targeted by criminals as easy victims.

Explain the problem to the 9-1-1 operator and stay on the phone.

#### IF IT ISN'T AN EMERGENCY:

- -Call your local police precinct for advice.
- -Help is only a few minutes away.
